POLICY GROUP 2 – INSTRUCTION

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS-HIGHEST RANKING GRADUATE, PG-2.4A HONOR STUDENTS, AND CLASS RANKING

HONOR GRADUATE CERTIFICATE

The Texas Education Agency provides each high school in the district (local education agency) with one “honor Graduate Certificate.” This certificate shall be presented to the highest-ranking graduate in the senior class. Under no circumstances should a student ranked lower than “highest” be awarded the honor. This certificate authorizes the president of any state supported college or university to provide a waiver for tuition. *Education Code 54.201*

HIGHEST RANKING GRADUATE

Highest ranking graduate honors shall be awarded to the student with the highest weighted GPA in the graduating class and shall be entitled to wear a stole with the words “Highest Ranking Graduate” inscribed. To calculate the top-ranking student, grades shall be carried out to the fifth decimal place. Each high school may award only one student except in the case of a tie as specified in the Attorney General’s opinion: “An institution of higher education is authorized to issue scholarships to more than one person in any case in which the relevant school district certifies a tie for the title of “highest ranking graduate,” pursuant to Section 54.201 of the Texas Education Code.” *Education Code 54.201, Op. Atty. Gen 19892-No.MW-529*

HONOR STUDENTS

The top ten students in the graduating class will be designated as honor students and shall be entitled to wear the double gold cord identifying honor graduates at the graduation ceremonies. Certificates of merit also shall be issued to honor students.

a. Eligibility for highest ranking graduate or honor student

To be eligible for highest ranking graduate or honor student, a student who enrolls during his last year of residency (senior) shall:

1. Have been enrolled as a full-time student in TPHS no later than the end of the first nine-week grading period of the fall semester.
2. Have been enrolled as a full-time student and received grades in at least two full nine-week grading periods in the last year of residency.
3. Must have completed all credit and state assessment requirements for graduation by the day designated for submission of senior final grades.

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b. Exception to Residency Rule 1 and 2.

For TPHS campuses in their first year of operation only, in the event that the highest ranking graduate and/or top 10 do not meet residency rules 1 and 2 above, residency rule 1 and 2 will not apply. All other ranking rules are applicable. However, if the highest ranking graduate does meet residency requirements 1 and 2 this exception will not apply to the highest ranking graduate nor the top ten.

HOME SCHOOL CREDIT ACCEPTANCE

In accordance with Title 19, (TAC), §74.26(a)(2), students transferring from home schools will be treated the same as student transferring from unaccredited private schools. Credits for courses taken in home schooling may be awarded by reviewing the student's curriculum and work or through appropriate assessments.

CLASS RANKING

For the purpose of determining honors to be conferred during graduation activities, completion of grades for class ranking shall be done at the end of the third nine-week grading period. For the purpose of applications to institutions of higher education, campuses shall also calculate class rank as required by state law.

Grades for graduating seniors shall be considered as final averages for the purpose of this computation as of this date.

Computation of averages shall be carried out to the fourth decimal place; exception being only in the case of the highest ranking senior. To calculate the highest ranking senior, grades shall be carried out to the fifth decimal place.

Grades used for computation of all honors shall be from grades 9-12, including summer school grades from a TEA accredited summer school. This will include work done during the summer between completion of the eighth grade and formal entry into the ninth grade. Grades earned for high school credit at the eighth grade, dual credit courses, correspondence courses, courses for

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which a pass/fail grade is assigned, credit by exam with or without prior instruction, duplicate courses and local credit courses shall not be counted in the computation of final averages for ranking.

a. Transferred Grades

Transferred grades and credits already awarded by a sending district will be honored. Grades transferred as numerical averages will be accepted at face value. Transferred weighted courses other than Pre-AP and AP, will only count as non-weighted courses. Grades transferred merely as passing or failing shall be accepted for credit, or none, as indicated in the transcript, but will not be calculated into class ranking, unless there is some accompanying explanatory information on the transcript. Letter grades of transferred students from outside the district shall be assigned the following value, if a numerical value is not provided.

A+ = 98	B+ = 88	C+ = 78	D+ = 68
A = 95	B = 85	C = 75	D = 65
A - = 92	B- = 82	C- = 72	D- = 62

F = Numerical average is so transcribed, or if not, the number assigned shall be 59.

b. Weighted Grading System

Pre-AP, AP, and Dual Credit courses, whether transferred or offered at a future date, will be weighted. In computing the weighted average, a non-weighted course grade will stand as recorded. Weighted Pre-AP course grades will be multiplied by 1.05. AP and Dual Credit grades will be multiplied by 1.15. Weights will be used only for ranking and will not be reflected on the transcript.

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
